From the ISUAA president

Greetings and welcome to our 2021 winter issue!

We thank ISU President Terri Goss Kinzy and Scott Kinzy, who joined us for the ISUAA fall breakfast meeting on September 8. Delightfully, they made it a point to meet members prior to and following the event! Dr. Kinzy presented a summary of her impressions and initial two months in office and made several announcements.

She noted that, in comparison to our previous year that demanded many changes as a result of the pandemic, ISU is returning to a more traditional college experience for 2021-2022. Illinois State University welcomed 3,374 freshmen for 2021-2022, and total enrollment stands at 20,233. The academic quality of this year's freshman class has increased further with a high school GPA of 3.6 on a 4.0 scale and average ACT score now 24.

This incoming class also includes more than 447 new students in the Honors Program, the largest number for an incoming class ever. Kinzy also mentioned that the current student body is more diverse, with 28 percent of the total student population coming from traditionally underrepresented groups.

President Kinzy spoke personally about the lovely welcome she and Scott are receiving from all over campus and within the community. She mentioned that she had been told that Illinois State would be a wonderful university to lead, and they have been experiencing that sense of specialness here in many ways. Thank you President Kinzy and Scott for joining us! We wish you much success as you lead Illinois State University!

We look forward to seeing many of you at our December 1 holiday luncheon. Bill Legett, ISU's director of Event Management, Dining, and Hospitality (EMDH), will present "The Renovation of the Bone Student Center." You will not want to miss it!

At our September 8 meeting, we held the annual elections and award presentation. See inside for the full results. John Walker has been elected vice president. Since I will have completed four full years and two terms as president at the end of October, John has agreed to serve as interim president. He will be elected to that position at our November board meeting. Thank you John! I know you will serve well.

This newsletter will be my last, although I will assist John as needed and plan to stay on the ISUAA board as ex-officio. I am **extremely grateful** to all who have assisted me during my tenure. The list is too long to mention all names. Along with appreciation for each contributor to the newsletters, the expert printing staff, and the ISUAA Board, I especially thank Larry Alferink, who has served as a mentor. It has been a challenge and an honor to serve as your president. Thank you and best wishes to all!

How time flies

150 years ago–1871

In his semiannual report, President Richard Edwards announced 536 students were in attendance in the Normal Department and laboratory schools. This number far exceeded the capacity of what was then called the Administrative Building (later, Old Main). According to Edwards, “some 40 or more (students) have been compelled to sit in the aisles, and to hold their books on the window-sills.” To complicate matters, the air quality in the building remained poor. Edwards proclaimed, “To demand that they shall have vigorous frames and exhibit ruddy cheeks while inhaling the impurities that daily float through the rooms and passage-ways of this house is to demand an impossibility.”

100 years ago–November/December, 1921

- *The Vidette* declared Homecoming a success. Said to be the “greatest event ever held on the Normal Campus,” Homecoming proved to be popular among students and alumni. In addition to the festivities, two students dug up a fruitcake they buried in 1917 before they entered into World War I—and ate it at that evening’s Philadelphians meeting. *The Vidette*, November 9, 1921 (Vol. 34, No. 9, page 1).
- The news that President David Felmley was considering cutting Thanksgiving vacation from two days to one did not sit well with students. Upon calling a special session, Student Council appointed a committee to draft a petition: “Whereas it has been intimated that the regular two day Thanksgiving vacation will be cut to one day, and, Whereas other schools will observe their regular vacation, and Whereas there is no just reason for thus cutting the ISNU vacation, and Whereas the students and faculty have signified their wishes that the regular vacation of two days be allowed, We, the members of the student’s council, as the student’s representatives, petition you, as president of the institution, to allow Thursday and Friday, November 24 and 25, for Thanksgiving holiday.” *The Vidette*, November 16, 1921 (Vol. 34, No. 10, page 1).

75 years ago–November/December, 1946

- Staff of the yearbook, *The Index*, announced plans for the upcoming annual. In the next volume, *Index* staff planned to fill the book with “vital photography” as a way to keep the yearbook relevant and “never get into an attic.” *The Vidette*, November 6, 1946 (Vol. 59, No. 8, page 1).
- William L. Hodge penned a letter to the editor of *The Vidette* asking why the Memorium Gold Star Honor Roll window no longer featured fresh flowers. Noting the artificial flowers

seen recently in the window, Hodge recalled the fresh flowers from the University greenhouse used to decorate the memorial. Hodge asked, “Is it too much effort for someone to walk a block and a half every morning to the greenhouse and back? Have we forgotten too soon?” *The Vidette*, December 4, 1946 (Vol. 59, No. 10, page 2).

- Study carrels were in full use at Milner Library. Described by Milner staff as “cells on one side of a cloister,” the 56 study nooks contained a desk, shelves, and a light for an individual faculty member or graduate student. *The Vidette*, December 18, 1946 (Vol. 59, No. 12, page 2).

50 years ago–November/December, 1971

- At the Hyde Park Speakout event held in the University Union, audience members spoke at length about parking woes on campus. While most supported the idea of eliminating parking fees, some suggested creating larger parking lots and a shuttle service. *The Vidette*, November 16, 1971 (Vol. 84, No. 26, page 1).
- The Normal Chamber of Commerce began circulating a “wet-dry” petition for a March ballot referendum. Questions about the referendum circulated along with the petition including the wording of the referendum, the type of ballot that would be used in town, and “the ramifications of 18-year-olds voting a product they cannot legally consume.” *The Vidette*, December 3, 1971 (Vol. 84, No. 29, page 1)

25 years ago–November/December, 1996

- Mark Larson, junior acting major, jumped at the chance to write the score for the upcoming play, *The Rivals*. Analyzing 18th-century music, the once music theory/composition major created a score “that helps enhance the mood of the play as well as illustrate aspects of the characters.” *The Daily Vidette*, November 5, 1996 (Vol. 109, No. 63, page 11).
- Elizabeth Chapman was named the permanent associate provost effective November 1. The new associate provost had early goals, including a desire to “link planning and budgeting more closely and to encourage greater involvement from the campus community.” Chapman also aimed to provide more multimedia classrooms to campus, connecting every classroom to a network. *The Daily Vidette*, November 6, 1996 (Vol. 109, No. 764, page 3).
- The Athletics Department announced the naming of the Athletic Study Center on behalf of longtime ISU Athletics supporter Karin Bone. The wife of the University’s ninth president, Bone was an ardent supporter of ISU athletics, and the naming of the then six-year-old center for her was a fitting tribute. The new name coincided with the center’s move to its new 4,000-square-foot home above the ROTC complex off of University Street. *The Daily Vidette*, December 6, 1996 (Vol. 109, No. 84, page 3).

ISUAA election and award results

We look forward to learning soon who the faculty representative will be.

The Award Committee Chair Jan Cook, along with President Gail Lamb, presented the **ISUAA Distinguished Service Award to Neil Gridley**. He has provided outstanding service to ISUAA for several years and is very deserving of this honor. Congratulations!

Important notice: Enhanced Illinois State University email security

For those using @ilstu.edu email, you received information and instructions that Illinois State University is upgrading Office 365 email security. Illinois State now uses Multi-Factor Authentication, or MFA for short, as a safeguard against fraudulent access. MFA uses another device or contact method to confirm you are signing into your account. You may have experience using MFA with your other accounts, such as your bank. You will be able to choose to use a voice phone call, text message, or a smartphone app notification for this second validation.

To continue using @ilstu.edu email, you need to complete the MFA setup process before **December 1**. Instructions on how to do this were included in the announcement email that you received in August or September. These instructions and more information can be found by going to the website ITHelp.IllinoisState.edu and searching for "MFA." The article titled "Overview of Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA)" is a great place to start. Help is available by calling, chatting, or emailing the Technology Support Center; or you can go to TechZone in the Bone Student Center.

Alumni Association—Homecoming royalty

The impact that this year's Homecoming king and queen have made on Illinois State University is monumental. Their involvement, support, and love for the University make it fitting that **Lynda Lane '66**

and **Carl Kasten '66** were crowned during a milestone year as Illinois State celebrated the 100th anniversary of its Homecoming.

Lane came to campus in 1962 to study French. Along with her studies, she chaired the Big Four Committee, joined the French Club, and chaired the Homecoming Committee. Homecoming is one of Lane's fondest memories as she recalls attending the parade, bonfire, game, and dance, as well as meeting President Robert Bone. She also never forgets how she was a part of a historical university time when Illinois State Normal University became Illinois State University her sophomore year and enrollment doubled in size.

Kasten shares the same memory as Lane. While serving as student senate president, he worked with campus officials on the name change itself. While busy with his studies in social science education, he found time to join the Men's Glee Club, Young Democrats, and LUNA. Kasten will never forget the time he also attended President Bone's midnight reception on the Quad upon his return from the Middle East.

Following their graduation in 1966, Lane and Kasten continued to pursue their professional passions. Lane spent her career in the classroom starting as a French teacher in a Chicago suburb. After she married, she and her husband moved back to Central Illinois, where she continued to teach elementary and eventually high school English. She retired as Olympia High School's Department Chair of English and Foreign Language and continued to substitute until 2020. Kasten attended Northwestern University's School of Law and earned his degree in 1969. For the next 48 years, he practiced law, primarily in the field of personal injury and wrongful death litigation.

As Redbird alumni, Lane and Kasten have made their marks on campus as servant leaders. Both served on the Alumni Association Board of Directors, Kasten for 14 years and Lane for 37. Kasten was also appointed to the University's inaugural Board of Trustees and served as its chair for many years. He co-founded the ISU Attorneys Advisory Council and served as a trustee for the State University Retirement System. Lane stays involved as a volunteer at Ewing Manor as well as serving on several Alumni Association committees. Both love to attend Illinois State events such as the Half Century

Club reunion, Redbird Athletics games, and Homecoming. It is no surprise that each has been recognized by the Alumni Association Awards program with Lane as the 2017 E. Burton Mercier Service Award recipient and Kasten as the 2014 Distinguished Alumni Award recipient.

Lane and Kasten echoed each other as they expressed their love and pride for Illinois State. "The University has given so much to each alumnus," said Kasten. "It is simple to give back and find a way to support the place that helped your family and your career." Lane added, "ISU prepared me for a life of service. I'm grateful for the experiences ISU afforded me and want to give back to a place that followed me through my life."

ISUAA holiday luncheon featuring a presentation by Bill Legett

The ISUAA annual holiday luncheon will be held from 11:30 a.m.–1 p.m. on Wednesday, **December 1**, in the **Old Main Room at the Bone Student Center**. We are delighted that the program will be presented by Bill Legett, ISU director of Event Management, Dining, and Hospitality (EMDH). One of 13 departments within Student Affairs, EMDH provides the campus and guests high-quality, efficient, and innovative event services and dining options in a variety of settings that accentuate and enhance the campus experience in a diverse community.

EMDH is the largest department on campus with 1,300 employees and a budget of \$35 million. As director, Bill provides direct oversight of two residential dining centers, 11 on-campus retail dining venues, University Catering Services, and all dining services at the Lab Schools and childcare centers on campus. In addition, under his leadership is the daily management of all events and services at the Bone Student center and Braden Auditorium. Facility management of both the Student Services building and the Multicultural Center building are also managed by EMDH.

Over the past five years, Bill led the Bone Student Center revitalization and concourse projects at Illinois State University. The Bone Student Center attracts about 5,000 daily visitors and hosts more than 4,500 events in a typical year. The \$32.9 million renovation and \$11 million concourse improvement projects were completed spring 2021 at the landmark resource to the Bloomington-Normal community and a hub of student life at the University.

The new additions include the Office of Admissions presentation space, Student Involvement Center, Career Services, Welcome Desk/Box Office, new dining venues, several campus partner locations, improved event space, outdoor seating in the courtyard, and many collaboration spaces designed for student engagement.

Bill continues to work with Facilities Management and Planning to ensure department facilities are well maintained and to plan for future projects that will provide welcoming spaces that current/prospective students, faculty, staff, alumni, and visitors to Illinois State University will use for many years to come.

Bill started at Illinois State in 2012 as the associate director of Residential, Retail, and Catering Dining Operations. In November

2016, he was named interim director of Campus Dining Services. In July 2017, Bill was announced as the first director for the newly formed EMDH unit. He is a graduate of Eastern Illinois University with a bachelor's degree in hospitality management and business, and spent more than 20 years in the hotel lodging industry prior to starting with Illinois State. This included management of several local hotels as well as hotels in Chicago, Springfield, and Indianapolis. He was awarded the McLean County Hospitality Industry Person of the Year in 2000, the Illinois Hotel and Lodging Association's Hotelier of the Year in 2004, and The Marriott Presidential Award for outstanding Hospitality, among other professional accomplishments.

Despite his professional responsibilities, he still finds time to be involved with the local community. Bill is currently a board member for the Bloomington-Normal Girls Softball Association, a coach for his daughter's softball team, and a registered Illinois High School Association umpire. He previously was chair of the Bloomington-Normal Sports Commission, president for the Bloomington-Normal Hotel and Lodging Association, member of the McLean County Economic Leadership Board, PTO president for Sugar Creek Elementary School for 17 years, and taught as an adjunct at Lincoln College. Bill spends most of his time away from work with his wife Lisa and their seven children. One is an ISU graduate and another a current ISU junior.

The holiday meal this year will consist of a house salad with a variety of dressings, a choice of Heartland pot roast or pan-seared salmon with lemon tarragon sauce, vegetables, rolls and butter, dessert or a fruit cup, and coffee or iced tea. The cost for the meal is \$20. Reservations are due by November 19, with the form at the back of this newsletter. Please mail the form by November 17 in order that it may reach us by the deadline. Professor Thomas McClure endows fund for the Illinois State University expungement clinic

The Illinois State University expungement clinic, which began in partnership with Prairie State Legal Services (PSLS) in fall 2020, has been strengthened by the generosity of Thomas McClure '76, M.S. '01. The clinic provides hands-on legal experience to Legal Studies students, who assist low-income individuals seeking to expunge and seal old criminal records. McClure is a professor within ISU's Politics and Government Department and the Department's Director of Legal Studies. In May 2021, he gave \$100,000 to create the Thomas E. McClure Pro Bono Fund. The endowed fund will provide ongoing support for the clinic and other pro bono activities associated with Illinois State's Legal Studies Program.

McClure, a longtime practitioner of law, came to Illinois State University on a debate scholarship. He earned a bachelor's degree in political science in 1976, and a Juris Doctorate in 1979 from DePaul University College of Law in Chicago. Following two years clerking for an appellate judge in Chicago, McClure went into private practice, where he would remain for 28 years. McClure was a 50 percent shareholder of Elliott & McClure, P.C. He managed the firm's Bourbonnais office and focused his practice on trial and appellate work.

While practicing law, McClure returned to Illinois State to complete a master's degree in political science. He began teaching legal studies courses part-time until he resigned from his law firm in 2009 to dedicate his work to Illinois State.

The Illinois State University Expungement Clinic began operation in earnest during the 2020-2021 academic year. Students



prepared case charts, requests for relief, notices, and orders for expungement and record sealing cases. McClure revised and reviewed the documents before submitting them to PSLs. Students completed documents for 30 cases.

“I think part of being a legal professional is also service to your community. And doing pro bono work is an important component,” McClure said of his desire to participate in the clinic.

“So, in my view, this is helping to expose students to something that they need to be aware of for the rest of their professional career.”

The pro bono work has been well-received by students, who learn clients’ stories when working on cases. McClure is hopeful others will find value in the clinic and contribute to the open fund he created.
